Accreditation is a means whereby the Sonshine Association of Christian Schools Inc. thereafter abbreviated SACS, may assist participating schools in the pursuit of quality as they seek excellence in their Christian school ministries. Accreditation is a voluntary process. Desiring school should conduct the self-study the basis of their ministries philosophy, policies, facilities.

A prerequisite to accreditation is a philosophy of education that conforms to Biblical standards, a demonstration that the school's program is in agreement with such philosophy, and can meet general standards that are considered characteristic of all SACS accredited schools.

The concepts of being recognized by peers, approved, seeking counsel, and performing a selfanalysis are Biblical. Such verses as Romans 12:17; 11 Cor. 8:21; Romans 14:8, 18; Phil. 1:10; James 1:22-25; Proverbs 15:22; and others speak of these concepts.

B. PHYSICAL FACILITIES

b. Are all surfaces or items accessible to children free of toxic materials? (Lead base paint is prohibited.)

2. Room Occupied by Children.-

- a. Do the rooms have a minimum of twenty foot candies of natural or artificial light and conform to the Southern Building Code? (5 foot candies during napping)
- b. Is an inside minimal temperature of 65 degrees Fahrenheit maintained when the outside temperature is less than 65 degrees Fahrenheit? (inside temperature may not exceed 85 degrees Fahrenheit.)

- c. Are medicines, cleaning supplies. flammables, and other potentially poisonous supplies stored out of children's reach and in such a manner as to ensure the safety of children?
- d. Have employees been trained in accord with OSHA hazardous chemicals requirements?

e. Are any firearms kept on the ministry campus?

- 3. Indoor Play Space:
 - a. Is there a minimum of twenty square feet (35sq. ft. for new facilities built after October 1, 1992) of usable floor space per child?
 - b. If infants are in care, do they have open play space outside of cribs and playpens?
- 4. Outdoor Play Space:
 - a. Is there a minimum of forty-five (45) square feet of usable, safe, and sanitary outdoor play area per child? (Play area shall be calculated at the rate of forty-five square feet per child in any group using the play area at one time.)
 - b. Is the outdoor play area clean, free of litter, nails, glass, and other obvious hazards? Is all stationary equipment firmly anchored and free of sharp and jagged edges?

c. Does the outdoor play area provide both sun and shade?

- e. Does the outdoor play areas have safe and adequate fencing or a wall at a minimum of four (4) feet in height?
- f. Are sand or sawdust boxes used in the outdoor play area constructed to allow for drainage, maintained in safe and sanitary condition, and covered when not in use?
- g. Are all water hazards such as pools, swimming pools, wading pools, ditches, fish ponds, etc. adequately fenced in accordance with accepted safety practices?

5. Napping Space:

a. Does the facility include designated areas where a child can sit quietly or lie down to rest or nap? (The capacity of napping space must be a minimum of twenty (20) square feel of usable space per child at rest at any time.)

- b. Are all bedding such as cots, beds, cribs, or floor pads (mats) covered with nonpermeable covers and sanitized daily?
- c. Are linens individually labeled and laundered at least once a week or more often if necessary? (Linens, if used for more than one child, shall be laundered between usage.)
- d. Is a minimum distance of eighteen inches maintained between individual napping spaces?
- e. Are double or multi-decked cribs, cots, or beds used?
- f. Are infants up- to one year of age in cribs or playpens with sides?
- g. Are nursery cots used for children one year of age and above?
- 6. Toilet and Bath Facilities
 - a. Is the child care facility provided with conveniently located toilet facilities?
 - b. Is there one toilet with seat and one wash basin for the first Fifteen children? Is there one toilet and one wash basin for every thirty children thereafter?
 - (1) If only diaper babies are cared for in the facility, is there one (1) toilet seat plus two (2) basins for every thirty (30) infants?
 - (2) If potty chairs are used, are they in addition to the above toilet facilities?
 - c. Does any toilet facility open directly into an area where food is prepared?
 - d. Are toilet and wash basins constructed at a level to allow children to conveniently use them? If toilets or wash basins are not installed at this level, has a platform been constructed?
 - e. Are the platforms of safe construction, nonporous covering, and easily clean-able?
 - f. Are children continuously supervised?
 - g. Does each child have their own towel marked, if disposable towels are not used?
 - h. Are toilet facilities supplied with liquid soap dispensers, paper towels, and deodorizers?

7, Isolation Area: Does the facility include a designated area for a child who becomes ill? (Such space shall be adequately ventilated and heated and equipped with a bed or cot and

materials that can be sanitized easily. Linens and disposable shall be changed after each use.)

8. Fire Safety

- a. Does the facility conform to Life Code 101 for fire safety, (or Uniform Fire Safety Standards for Child Care Facilities, Ha. Law Chapter 4A-36 FAC.)?
- b. Is there a working telephone which is not locked nor a pay phone in the facility?
- c. Is emergency lighting available in case of power failure?
- d. When infants are in care, is there an adequate supply of clean diapers, clothing, and sheets at all times?
- e. Are soiled items placed in covered containers, which are emptied and cleaned, and disinfected daily?
- f. Are children's wet or soiled clothing and crib sheets changed promptly?
- 10. Equipment:
 - a. Indoor Equipment: Does the facility have equipment and toys which are safe and sanitized daily?
 - b. Outdoor Equipment: Is there adequate equipment to provide suitable activities for the children served? Is all equipment installed safely and maintained in safe condition?
 - c. Does equipment, which exceeds greater than four feet, have a minimum of 6 inches of impact material under the equipment, such as wood chips or shredded tire?
 - d. Does child care playground equipment exceed 6 feet in height?

C. FIRST-AID TREATMENT AND EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

- 1. Are there first-aid supplies: soap, bandages, sterile gauze squares, adhesive tape, thermometer, tweezers, and disposable plastic gloves?
- 2. Are these supplies kept in a designated location in a covered and labeled "First-Aid?
- 3. Are parents notified immediately of any illness or injury to the child in the center?
- 4. Are there specific instructions available regarding action to be taken if parents cannot be reached?

- 5. Does the operator have at least two back-up emergency contacts designated in the child's records?
- 6. Does the facility have written instructions from parents for staff to follow in arranging for immediate treatment in emergencies?
- 7. Are children showing symptoms of illness during the day removed from the group to the isolation area where they shall receive necessary attention until such time as the facility and their parents can make plans for their care elsewhere or until they are read y to return to the group?
- 8. Are all children suspected of having a communicable disease isolated immediately and the condition reported to the parent?
- 9. Does the school have a published communicable disease statement in the parent/student handbook?

D. NUTRITION

- 1. Does the facility provide meals and snacks?
- 2. Are cafeteria facilities available?
- 3. Alternate nutrition plan: If meals and/or snacks are furnished by the child's parent, is there a written agreement signed by the parent and kept on file at the facility?
- 4. Have arrangements been made between the operator and a parent for a child's special diet when prescribed by a physician?
- 5. *Is* the physician's order and a copy of the diet and a sample meal plain for the special diet in the child's record? ______-
- 6. Are menus planned, written, and posted at the beginning of each week?
- 7. Are menus dated and posted in the food service area and in the areas where they are accessible to the parents?
- 8. Are infants fed, or supervised at feeding and offered foods appropriate for their age?
- 9. Is infant formula furnished by the parent, refrigerated, and handled in a sanitary manner by the facility?
- 10. Do all children bring their lunch from home?

E. FOOD PREPARATION AND FOOD SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

1. Sanitary Facilities and Controls:

- a. Are all rooms where food or drink is stored, prepared or served or where utensils are washed protected from dust, flies, vermin, rodents, and other contamination?
- b. Are the floors. walls, shelves, tables, utensils, and equipment in these rooms of such construction that they can be easily cleaned, kept clean, and in good repair?
- c. Is stored food placed in such a manner as to be free from dust, dirt, and splash?
- d. Are the walls finished in a light color with smooth, washable surfaced up to the level reached by splash or spray?
- e. Are rooms well-lighted, ventilated, and openings effectively screened?
- f. Is hot and cold running water, under pressure, easily accessible to all rooms where food is prepared or utensils are washed?
- g. Are any live animals or fowl kept or allowed in the kitchen?
- h. Are all multi-use eating and drinking utensils thoroughly cleansed with hot water and an effective detergent, then rinsed thoroughly?

i.. Is a three compartment sink or a two compartment sink and a dishwasher provided for the above purpose?

j. After bactericidal treatment, are utensils air dried and properly stored?

k. Is all litter, waste and rubbish placed in suitably covered receptacles until properly disposed or _____

- 1. Is garbage placed in covered, leak proof containers until properly disposed of?
- 2. Food Preparation:
 - a. *Is* all food and drink clean, wholesome, free from spoilage and prepared safely for human consumption?
 - b. Is ice cream and other frozen dessert from approved sources?
 - c. Is all milk and other drinking products pasteurized and served from the original containers in which they were packaged at the milk plant?
 - d. Are all readily perishable food or drink. kept at or below forty degrees, except when being prepared or served?

- 3. Food Storage: Does each refrigerator/freezer used for storage of perishable foods have an accurate thermometer located in the warmest part toward the front side of the appliance so that temperature can be easily observed?
- 4. Personnel:
 - a. Do all employees wear clean garments and keep their hands clean at all times while engaged in preparing and serving food and drink?
 - b. Are effective restraints used by food service workers to keep hair from food and contact surfaces?
 - c. Are persons suffering from a communicable disease or suspected of being a carrier of organisms that may cause a communicable disease employed for food preparation or service? ______-
 - d. Do employees in the food preparation and food service area have access to toilet and hand-washing facilities?
 - e. Do food handlers wear plastic disposable gloves at all times when dealing with the dispensing of open rood or drink?

F. ADMISSION AND RECORD KEEPING

- 1. Health Examination and Health Maintenance:

- d. Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of person (s) who can assume responsibility for the child if for some reason the parent (s) cannot be reached immediately in an emergency?
- e. Names and addresses of persons authorized to take the child from the facility?
- f. The name, address, and telephone number of a physician or health resource that can be called in case of emergency and the parent(s) written permission to consult that physician or health resource if the parent cannot be reached?
- g. If the child's condition requires it is a written health plan on file at the facility?
- h. Was this plan developed by a cooperative effort between the child's parent, the operator, and supervising physician and/or other specialists?
- i. Does this plan specify the handicapping condition and the special provisions which will be made to meet the needs of the handicapped child?
- 3. Personnel Records: Personnel records shall be maintained by the owner/operator for each employee of the facility and regular volunteer.
